

## **Consultation Response**

The Scottish Government's Proposed Programme for Reviewing and Extending Permitted Development Rights (PDR) in Scotland

January 2020





#### Introduction

Our Planning Law Sub-committee welcomes the opportunity to consider and respond to Scottish Government's consultation: *The Scottish Government's Proposed Programme for Reviewing and Extending Permitted Development Rights (PDR) in Scotland*<sup>1</sup>. We have the following comments to put forward for consideration.

#### **Consultation questions**

# Q1. Do you have any comments on the proposed Work Programme, including the proposed phasing and groupings?

We consider that the proposed programme and the groupings/phasing are logical and achievable. These appear to dovetail with other current policy aims and government themes. The work categories are appropriate as these will allow environmental developments which are relatively small in scale, but which will have a significant positive impact on climate change and sustainability to be carried out with minimum procedure and at less cost. PDR for these types of development should encourage more development and therefore are likely to produce a cumulative benefit.

From a legal perspective, we would recommend that there is precision in designating and defining the categories of extended PDRs as this will help to ensure clarity and certainty for owners and neighbours.
